Winter also invites me to reflect inward, take stock of what I am lucky to have and be a part of.

NEIGHBORING FAITHS

One of the things that I am grateful to be a part of has been the opportunity to work with our Middle School youth as they study their Neighboring Faiths curriculum. These students are vivacious and vibrant, their energy and curiosity is infectious. They have big ideas, and they ask big questions as we explore faiths outside of Unitarian Universalism. The next step to attract ministerial candidates is officially submitted. We've sent in our Congregational Record ("CR") to the Unitarian Universalist Association and now ministers in search know we're looking.

The CR document took a lot of homework, and many of you were generous with your time to help us dig out statistics and historical facts. The CR describes our congregation, the city of Lincoln, and tries to capture the sort of minister we're looking for. Much of the work was filling out forms, but the heart of the CR was essay question format that we can share with you. Look at the table under our Ministerial Search Process poster in the Gathering Space for a copy.

We understand there will be dozens of ministers in search—and dozens of other congregations trying to attract the best. Now the committee turns to finishing the second significant piece of the work—our "packet." While the CR is a shorter document that is really "just the facts, ma'am," the packet will be a website with lots more in depth information, photos, and even a video to show off our beautiful church. Julie has been the primary creative genius behind the website—and since you know how good she is at both documentary and artistic work, you know it's going to be great.

Soon, the committee will start receiving actual resumes from ministers with an interest in us. Remember the dating analogy? If seeking a minister is like dating, then this is the night before Prom and we are hoping someone asks us to dance. We're petrified and excited and hopeful.

Fiber artist Phyllis Moore will continue to display "Great Aunts Revisited" in the Unitarian Church Art Gallery in December. The exhibit features large-scale fiber works of women in her old family photographs, the great aunts of her childhood, always peripheral figures, now silent and faded: a feathery trace against the blue sky of memory.

Phyllis Moore is the proud descendent of twenty-some great aunts, many of whose lives centered in the blue-stem grass country of the Flint Hills of Central Kansas. Listen through the prairie wind to a litany of given names: Susan Mary, Gertrude, Mable Alice, Bertha and Nettie, Ruth, Eva and Delia, Maude and Mary. All of these ladies lived in or near the village of Parkerville. Moore has a Master of Arts in English from Utah State University, with additional work at Columbia University in NYC.

Phyllis is the author of a quilt memoir called "The Space Between The Stars." Phyllis and her husband Harlan Heald met for the first time in the Unitarian Church in the mid 1970's. Phyllis and Harlan live in Lincoln, Nebraska.

Capital Campaign News

The outstanding obligation to the various church members who lent money to help fund the building renovations is \$420,000. The first loan of \$100,000 was due 12-22-16. The lenders agreed to roll this loan over for another year so it will now be due in December 2017.

If the congregation approves at the Dec. 4 Winter Congregational Meeting, money left to the church by Judy Cole will be used to match contributions to pay loans. As loans become due, if we don't have sufficient funds to pay them, we'll see if the lenders are willing to renew their loans for a year. If not, we'll seek other lenders or use the line of credit at Union Bank.

At the end of May, letters were mailed to all contributors to the Capital Campaign. The letters noted the status of individual capital campaign financial commitments. Since that mailing, some people completed payment on their commitments

or made further partial payments. A few others have given additional contributions.

Recently 3rd quarter statements were mailed. They show the status of any mortgage pledge you made and its balance. Please check your numbers to see if they agree.

As of 10-31-16, the balance in the Capital Campaign Fund was \$72,307. There are two remaining building project expenses to cover - an exhaust fan in the kitchen that was overlooked during roofing and some final work related to runoff mitigation. In December we'll pay the loan amounts due as shown on the schedule above. In January, all funds in this account will be merged into the Mortgage Fund and used for paying principal and interest on member loans.

Interest on \$100,000 loan & all other loans = \$10,595.21

Due in January 2017: \$20,000 loan + interest = \$20,034.25

Due in February 2017: \$50,000 loan + interest = \$50,178.08

Due in March 2017: \$5,000 loan + interest = \$5,022.95

Due in September 2017: \$20,000 loan + interest = \$20,371.23

Due in November 2017: \$15,000 loan + interest = \$15,314.38

Due in December 2017: \$100,000 loan + interest = \$102,000

Interest on other outstanding loans = ~\$6,440
