My Cup Runneth Over

My cup runneth over. Those words from the 23rd Psalm have been on my tongue for the last several weeks. June has been a month of celebration, and a month of mourning. This month the congregation held a service on ordination and installation of my ministry here in Lincoln. The minister who married Stacie and me joined us to dedicate our daughter Ailish. "You are ordained," Madelyn Campbell told me during the service, "you will never not be ordained." The week after the ordination, over fifty of us attended General Assembly, a remarkable showing from this congregation. It was special to share those moments with all of you.

And also, in June, we have marked the loss of many beloved members of our community. In the week that I am writing this, we have memorial services for Bob Stoddard, Ginny Gross, and Jonathan Werner. We gather together in community in times of grief and in times of celebration.

The poet Khalil Gibran put it this way:

Your joy is your sorrow unmasked. And the selfsame well from which your laughter rises was oftentimes filled with your tears. And how else can it be?

The deeper that sorrow carves into your being, the more joy you can contain.

When you are joyous, look deep into your heart and you shall find it is only that which has given you sorrow that is giving you joy.

When you are sorrowful look again in your heart, and you shall see that in truth you are weeping for that which has been your delight.

Our cups runneth over, in joy and in sorrow. One of the six sources of Unitarian Universalism listed in our association's covenant are the Christian and Hebrew scriptures. Each of us has reason to emphasize different sources at different times, and while I do not identify as Christian, I often return to the language and metaphor of scripture in my own spiritual practice.

It is tradition for installed ministers to give the congregation a gift to mark the occasion, something that represents a part of the minister's identity, and that meets a need within the congregation. My other spiritual practice is calligraphy, so I have chosen to donate a copy of the St. John's Bible to the congregation. The St. John's Bible was commissioned in 1999 and completed in 2011, the first complete handwritten illuminated Bible in several hundred years. It is as much a piece of art as scripture. It is my hope that it will live in our gallery space (one volume at a time) where our 19th century pulpit Bible rested until last fall. May it be a source of beauty in our lives together, and of wisdom in times of both sorrow and joy.

Coming of Age

This year, we have two high school graduates who have been regularly attending members of our church.

Helen Little and Sammy Burchell.

Helen Little decided this last year to participate in our Coming of Age Program.

This program is offered to high school students at our church who wish to explore some of the big questions in life with a mentor. Kristi Wamstad Evans has been this guiding light for Helen in the past year.

The Coming of Age program is a rigorous series of readings and discussion questions based around finding your Unitarian Universalist identity and spiritual path.

Questions which the participants consider include "Is there life after death?" "Do you have a concept of God?" and "How do you summarize what we believe as Unitarian Universalists?" Sammy Burchell was a high school graduate but did not participate in our Coming of Age Program. I would like to extend my sincerest wishes for them both moving forward. Here is the statement which Helen presented during our Coming of Age/Bridging service in early June:

"Asking a newly graduated high schooler to define their beliefs on the questions that guide our human existence, like "Is there a God?" and "What is our purpose on this planet?" is like asking a plant sprout to host a squirrel nest: we simply do not have enough life experience to fulfill these requests. All there is to know is that there is no way to know the answers to these questions. Your truth may lie within a chosen path of belief that guides your moral decisions, but my truth follows the idea that humanity guides itself through the toils of life, usually by using the security of their religious ideas and communities. I don't think I will ever be able to believe in a singular, all powerful God who judges us based on the concepts of good and evil, yet that doesn't mean there isn't a mystical force that binds our interconnected web of existence. Who's to say?"

I'm claiming agnosticism as my current path of belief while remaining open to exploring other faiths, and this coming of age program has served as the start of my journey down the path of self-discovery.

I have probably felt the most spiritual connection to the world while surrounded by nature, where chaos and order seem to coexist in one of the truest forms of balance. I suppose I believe in the healing power of the natural world, and that our society's further removal from nature is only taking us away from our base state of being. My path is taking me in the direction of ecology and environmental engineering, but I hope to use natural systems to help local communities, in the efforts of contributing to our church's living tradition of social activism.

Our church's commitment to fostering individual spiritual growth, and to turning our founding principles into acts of advocacy, have greatly influenced my decisions in the past year as I faced decisions like choosing a college, major, and the path I would like to travel for awhile. Though the only belief I will claim at the moment is that it is impossible to believe in anything, there's no telling where my spiritual journey will take me.

Sunday, July 29 • 11:30AM • Gathering Place



On May 8, 2018, The Board of Trustees adopted an Environmental Policy Statement, written by the Green Sanctuary Committee. Guided by the Unitarian Universalist seventh principle and our core values, we are committed to: (1) promote environmental sustainability within our congregation and in the greater community; (2) actively support a rapid reduction of greenhouse gas emissions and transition to renewable energy; (3) conserve energy and natural resources; (4) use nontoxic and environmentally sound products and practices; (5) reduce, reuse and recycle. The policy statement includes general goals and specific actions.



Racial disparities are 6 to 1

At the end of 2014, the imprisonment rate among Black men was nearly six times that of white men. And the rate for Black women was double that of white women.

The world's prison capital

Since 1970 our incarcerated population has increased by 700 percent to 2.3 million people in jail and prison today, far outpacing population growth and crime. The United States spends over \$80 billion on incarceration each year.

50,000 barriers to success

Each year 600,000 people nationwide return from prison to immense challenges – including nearly 50,000 federal, state and local legal restrictions that make it difficult to reintegrate back into society.
