

Blessings

During the end of August and start of September, I was busy training our incredible volunteers who will be leading our Sunday School classes. During each training, I would do a variety of activities with the leaders. One of the activities which I asked them to do this year was to state a blessing, hope, or wish for a child. Only, there was a twist. I asked the leaders to blindly choose an item from a box and relate their blessing symbolically to the item which they chose. Here are their items and responses.

- Battery: "Children are full of energy. May we enjoy our time with the children, be energized by their vitality and energy. May we help them use their energy in a positive way."
- Small binder clip: "This keeps things organized and under control....which can be good. It's also a reminder to not be overly controlled and to be open to what happens in the moment."
- Lego: "Hope for feelings of real connectivity for students."
- Small clothespin: "Important to listen to children and gather their thoughts as something to hold on to."
- Pin that says "Broad Wings, Deep Roots": "I hope the children feel that church is their home where they can form deep roots and at the same time spread their wings as they learn new things."
- **Crayon:** "Let us try to let kids express their creativity in every way we can."
- All Purpose Glue Stick: "To make the wonderful crafts in our room. Children can come up with such beautiful art and I love to help nurture them. It is a meaningful, heartfelt purpose of mine to follow that path in my life."
- Carmex Lip Balm: "May our classrooms be a place of healing and soothing at times, the world can be scary and may we protect each other."
- **Purple dragon:** "My wish is that the children find working with adults as not scary. I hope the children grow and take wings."
- Tootsie Pop: "Don't forget the sweetness of life. It does exist in little pieces e.q. the calm of watching the stars, the smell of your favorite cookies baked

by your favorite relative, quietly waiting for a fish to bite, watching a new baby."

• Standing on the Side of Love Pin: "I hope to help children stand on the side of love. I think at our core we are all full of love and peace; it is the outer world that hardens us. I hope to foster this love and peace in children's interactions with their world, and that they may show me new ways of looking at the world in loving ways."

Micro-Loan/Matching Grant Opportunity Begins!

Last December, the congregation voted to establish a Short-Term Micro-Loan/Matching Grant program with funds from Judy Cole's bequest. Since then, a task force (Kristi Wamstad-Evans, Rich Little, Charles Coley, Heather Fox, Nick Hernandez, Lindsay Bartlett, and Dorothy Ramsey) met to establish the guidelines for the program.

The Task Force is pleased to announce the submittal period for the Short-Term Micro-Loan/Matching Grant program will open Sunday, October 1. Submittals will be accepted through Sunday, October 29. Members of the Task Force and designated Board members will be available on Sundays throughout October to answer questions and provide feedback on proposals.

The intent of both the Short-Term Micro-Loan and Matching Grant is to offer opportunities for new ideas to be developed to benefit the mission of the church. *Key questions* that will be asked by the reviewers include:

- Does the project support the Seven Guiding Principles?
- What is the potential benefit?
- Does it benefit UCL as a whole?
- What is the congregational impact?
- Does it promote UU principles beyond the walls of the church?

Eligible applicants include pledging members and youth from pledging member families. Applicants are encouraged to get an endorsement of their ideas from a relevant church committee. For example, if the idea will impact the physical building, then the Building Committee should be asked for a letter of support. Grant Task Force reviewers are not eligible to be primary applicants.

The Short-Term Micro-Loan is intended for projects that need a boost to gain traction and develop a self-sustaining funding source. The funding is for church activities, not independent businesses. In addition to the general questions

above, these projects will be asked to demonstrate how capacity will be built and describe the path to becoming self-sustaining, including any risk of failure. Recipients will be eligible for interest-free loans of up to \$3,000 (with some wiggle-room for demonstrated need). Applicants will be required to submit a plan for repayment of the loan over three years. Activity must begin within one year of receiving the grant.

The Matching Grant is intended for projects that contribute to Big Idea projects or enhance existing programs. In addition to the general questions, applicants will be asked to describe the proposed impact, the potential for church benefit, and the overall community benefit. Recipients will be eligible for up to \$3,000 in funds with a 100% match in either funds or in-kind contributions (i.e. volunteer time, donated materials, etc). Total matching contributions must be noted within one year of grant.


Share the Plate October 1 - People's City Mission Free Medical Clinic

Karen Schrader, Director of PCM Free Medical Clinic will speak October 1. Located just north of People's City Mission, the clinic provides primary care to uninsured residents of Lancaster County, filling gaps in the existing medical network where it is difficult to meet needs of low-income uninsured residents as quickly as necessary.

Medical services are provided through a network of volunteer doctors and other medical professionals, with a combination of day, evening and weekend hours. Volunteer doctors and medical professionals can focus on providing care while minimizing their administrative requirements, i.e. they can treat people without worrying about insurance coding, managing staff, paying rent, etc.

The staff and volunteers provide prompt treatment of minor medical needs and ongoing management of chronic health conditions. Services include immunizations, pediatric, chiropractic, orthopedic, neurology, dermatology, podiatry, school & sport physicals, medical, dental, vision, hearing, ENT, labs, women's health, and mental health.

LINCOLN ENVIRONMENTAL ACTION PLAN (LEAP)

Lincoln Environmental Action Plan is Lincoln's community blueprint for actions needed to create a healthier environment. A draft of LEAP was announced by city officials on July 11. At the press conference, Councilwoman Leirion Gaylor Baird stated, "We should act and adapt because the worst impacts of climate change are not inevitable. With environmental action plans like the one being announced today, we can mitigate the risks climate change poses to our economy, environment, and quality of life."

In 2016, the Mayor's Environmental Task Force formed five subcommittees to address energy, land use, transportation, waste, and water. Each committee wrote goals; action strategies and performance indicators were created. The Plan will be reviewed and updated every two years. Find out what Lincoln is doing to take the next steps. Will the minister be in the pulpit this Sunday? Who is the other person on the dais? What kind of music will there be today? Who brought those lovely flowers? Hopefully everyone who comes will say, "That was great (or beautiful or inspiring or thought provoking). Let's come back next week and see what happens then."

The joy, awe and reverence you experience each week is thanks to the coordinated work of many folks, some paid staff and many volunteers, and is included as part of our new Program Council. The Program Council consists of 8 clusters, each with several committees. The Sunday Services Cluster includes Worship Associates, Choir/Music, Pulpit Decoration, and Audio/Visual Committee.

- The Worship Associates work closely with the minister to plan the themes each month, coordinate the readings, suggest hymns, and do some of the work from the dais each Sunday. They also prepare and present an entire service each month during the school year as well as all the services during the summer.
- Choir/Music is deftly handled by the Worship Arts Director, Julie Cross. She solidifies the hymn choices, directs the choir, and organizes musicians when the choir is not singing.
- The Pulpit Decoration Committee has lots of volunteers who bring in decorations (mostly flowers but not always) for each Sunday.
- A/V is the behind-the-scenes committees whose work you don't notice until a mic doesn't work.
 They do get mishaps fixed very rapidly.

Much more work goes into Sunday Services than these few words can convey. Although there are a few staff members involved, much of the work is done by volunteers - people like you! The country setting where she lives and works provides a serene atmosphere and an endless supply of subject matter. She often pairs them with glass bottles that she has collected over the years. Regardless of her choice of objects for a specific painting, her main concern is always resolving the composition using all she has learned about the elements and principles of design.
